A Parishioner has requested that the village Hall light to be put on earlier in the morning so that there is light when they walk to work around 6 am. However, the lights come on at 6 am and goes off at 11 pm so should be on when they need it.</li> <li>2. There has been a complaint about people riding bicycles on pavements with dogs running alongside them.</li> <li>3. Reports have been made of large amounts of litter under the Railway Bridge in the village.</li> <li>4. This was due to leave that I had taken over last month's meeting. It comes with regret that I will be departing covering your area, which I have covered for the last two years. I wish the parish council and its members all the best in the future. I am continuing my role but will be based in Penrith town centre. I will remain covering your area up until the 15<sup>th</sup> November where PCSO 5397 Erica Norman will take over from me. The good news is Erica knows the area very well and I hope her all the best.</i></p> <p><i>I have read the minutes of the last meeting and note that CCTV may be installed at Lazonby Railway Station (&amp; other villages). I am all in favour of this. CCTV at railway stations is useful as the police deal on a regular basis with missing people who sometimes can be at risk to themselves. On many occasions, I have visited Penrith Railway station to view CCTV to establish a missing person's last known sightings or to confirm they have not used the train. CCTV is also an invaluable tool to reduce the likelihood of a crime but also is as important for crime detection. CCTV at most rural railway stations is rarely monitored and is only viewed if there is a purpose to view it. Please email me or Erica if it is installed so we can make a note that CCTV is</i></p>

### **CRIME PREVENTION**

*There has been a number of Residential Burglaries in the Penrith area from the period August until October. All breaks have been similar where rear doors/windows have been forced. The burglars have been stealing cash and jewellery. Police have several leads and work is currently ongoing to catch those responsible. Police are advising residents to speak to neighbours if they are due to go out for a few hours or even go on holiday and ask them to keep an eye out. Further to this if, you see a suspicious incident where people are suspiciously going around gardens please ring 999 and report the incident at the time and give as much detail to the call handler as possible. In all none, emergencies please use 101 or 101 emails.*

#### **Crime prevention points-**

- Consider leaving a light on inside the house when out and draw blinds/ curtains.
- Do not store valuables in windows that can be seen from the public eye.

##### **Local residents are being urged not to employ uninvited doorstep callers**

*If work needs to be done on your property, known and reputable traders should be used. Residents should be extremely wary of any doorstep caller looking to carry out gardening or building work.*

*Although it is not illegal for traders to go door to door, unless there are specific restrictions within that location, most agreements entered into must come with written cancellation rights unless the cost is under £42.*

*Our advice as always is not to deal with unexpected cold callers as this is a favoured approach used by rogue traders whose sole intention is to extract as much money from residents as possible. Business Approval reputable*

	c. Telephone Box near the Old School (last minute no. 19/197).	<p>The Council received an update about the Telephone Box near the Old School. It was reported at the September 2019 meeting of the Parish Council that the telephone box near the Old School (Croglin Toys) was possibly going to be decommissioned. However, the phone box has now had a reprieve as the signal for mobile phones is non-existent in that area, so BT has decided to keep the telephone box and continue to maintain it for the time being. Also, another Parish Council in Eden has asked Lazonby Parish Council for advice on how they have managed to retain the telephone box. The Council were happy with the proposed amendments</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that the Parish Council agreed to adopt the latest version of the Financial Regulations.</p>
	<b>e. Hedgehog Warning Signs (last minute no. 19/195).</b>	<p>The Council received an update about the Hedgehog warning signs. County Councillor Hilary Carrick, having investigated on behalf of Parish Council, has been advised that it is possible to get signs installed. If the Parish Council would like to pursue this you will need to contact the Highways team and make a case for them being installed, stating where they would like the signs and why. Councillor Carrick will let the Parish Council have the most appropriate contact.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that Councillor Gill Sharples will look into where to site the Hedgehog warning signs, and ask other parishioners their opinions.</p>
	<b>f. Parish Council representatives on Committees of local organisations (last minute no. 19/195).</b>	<p>The Council received an update about the Parish Council representatives on Committees of local organisations. The Council received a letter response to their own letter about representatives on committees, from the Swimming Pool committee asking if the Council would accept the Pool's apologies for the misunderstanding from one of their new Trustees about the role of the Parish Council representative on the Swimming Pool Committee. They explained the situation and also outlined what their committee through the role of representatives from other organisations/bodies were, and then asked if the Parish Council could confirm whether their understanding of the role of a representative is correct so that in future there would hopefully be no further misunderstandings.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that the following points are made to all external committees that have a Parish Council representatives, regarding their role is in order to clear up any further confusion or misunderstanding:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The Parish Council would like their representatives to have confirmation of meetings, including agendas and minutes.</li> </ol>
	<b>g. Replacing the existing Photocopier Printer Model (last minute no. 19/195).</b>	<p><b>RESOLVED</b> that it be noted that the meeting had to be cancelled with the Midshire Rep due to unforeseen circumstances but the meeting will be rearranged for a future date.</p>
	<b>h. Great North Air Ambulance Invitation (last minute no. 19/195).</b>	<p>The Council received an update on the Great North Air Ambulance visit, at Langwathby, on 3<sup>rd</sup> October 2019. The Councillors that attended had an enjoyable and interesting visit</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that the report about the visit to Great North Air Ambulance (GNAA) in Langwathby be noted with thanks to the GNAA.</p>

<p><b>i. Dog Fouling and loose dogs (last minute no. 19/192).</b></p>	<p>The Council received an update about the dog fouling and loose dogs in the field near the river Eden. The Clerk wrote to the Community Wardens to report the misuse of the footpaths in the fields near the swimming pool and campsite in Lazonby, next to the River Eden. A complaint was made to the Parish Council at their October 2019 meeting, about the misuse of the footpaths in the fields near the swimming pool and campsite in Lazonby, next to the River Eden. It was reported that large groups of dogs were being exercised there and let off their leads to run around in groups, near fields used for livestock. Also, the amount of dog faeces has continued to increase, including being bagged and then left by the path. The Community Wardens have replied to say that they are not sure that the areas and footpaths to which have been referred too are covered by the PSPO. The PSPO basically covers the towns and villages of Eden, and these footpaths look to head out of the village and away from it, then they won't be able to take any enforcement action over either fouling or dogs off the lead. However, they will check with their manager next week though, to be sure. They could put up posters on the access points to those footpaths but not beyond it. Any livestock worrying, which would be down to dogs being off the lead, and is a matter for the landowners to report to the police, and they can get signs from the NFU which they could put up on their fences and may have done already. It was then further reported at the meeting that the Community wardens have said that they will visit the village more and have put signs up near the river Eden and Tallow Whins. The red flags on dog poo are back in use and more dog poo bags have been put at the river area.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that Councillor Chris West will ask the NFU about the signs about livestock.</p>
<p><b>j. Lights on Fiddlers Lane (last minute no. 19/205).</b></p>	<p>The Council considered the future of the lights on Fiddlers Lane. Following the discussion at the last meeting, County Councillor Hilary Carrick would like to thank a parishioner and Councillor Tim Wright for confirming the ownership of the land adjacent to Eden Court and providing Councillor Carrick with a contact for Anchor Housing (Anchor Hanover) respectively. Consequently, Councillor Carrick has made contact with the Estates Manager for Anchor Housing who now needs to know what the Parish Council is seeking to achieve. The Parish Council discussed the cost to erect the light, and the maintenance cost implications and who should be responsible for this, as it is not Parish Council land.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that the Council agree not to pursue the installation of a light on Fiddlers Lane as it was felt it should not be the responsibility of the Parish Council.</p> <p><b>ALSO RESOLVED</b> that Councillor Chris West will contact Anchor Hanover if they would be prepared to install the light instead for the benefit of their residents.</p>
<p><b>k. Memorial for Chris Hill (last minute no. 19/206).</b></p>	<p>The Council considered the idea of putting a memorial to Chris Hill, who was a longstanding Parish Councillor and active member of the local community, up in the parish. The idea of planting a tree or trees was further discussed. The woodland Trust tree planting pack still needs to be further looked into for the possibility of planting trees on the Parish playing field. The Council discussed the possibility of putting a memorial tree on Scaur Close Green with a plaque on Memory of Chris Hill.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that Councillor Chris West will ask Geoff Wilson, who carried out the Scaur Close Green project if it would be OK to put a memorial Tree on the green for Chris Hill.</p>

		<b>ALSO RESOLVED</b> that Councillor Phillip Whitehead will enquire about the Woodland Trust Tree mixed-species packs for planting on the Parish playing field.
	<b>I. CCTV at Lazonby Station (last minute no. 19/191).</b>	<p>The Council received an update about CCTV at Lazonby Station. As reported at the October 2019 meeting of the Parish Council, Northern Rail is installing CCTV at Lazonby, Langwathby and Armathwaite train stations. The Council was told that Armathwaite opinions about CCTV are mixed, and asked if any rail users in Lazonby have any comments about this please contact the Clerk so that they can be fed back to Northern Rail. The Clerk reported this in the Parish Council Newsletter. So far one response from a parishioner has been received who objected strongly to the proposal for CCTV cameras to be installed at Lazonby Station saying that they believed that they are a blatant invasion of privacy; and that they might be appropriate in a setting like a major station such as Leeds or Bradford, but that they had no place in a quiet rural station like Lazonby. The Police are in support of the CCTV at Lazonby station.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that the report about the CCTV at the station be noted.</p> <p><b>ALSO RESOLVED</b> that the Clerk inform the local community Police when the CCTV has been installed.</p>
<b>19/220</b>	<b>Report from District Councillor Gordon Nicolson.</b>	<p>The Council received a report from District Councillor Gordon Nicolson about Eden District Council matters affecting the Parish.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The Eden District Council Plan consultation event took place at Rheged on Tuesday 1st October 2019, with three separate sessions to allow a range of conversations with members of the public, key partners and stakeholders.</li> <li>2. Warm Homes Eden are helping people who are struggling with heating bills, and on a low income with a chronic health condition If people wish to discuss matters further and see if they qualify then please contact Warm Homes Eden on 01768 593240 or you can Email: warmhomes@cafs.org.uk.</li> </ol> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that District Councillor Gordon Nicolson be thanked for his report, the contents of which were noted.</p>
<b>19/221</b>	<b>Report from County Councillor Hilary Carrick.</b>	<p>The Council received a written report from County Councillor Hilary Carrick about County Council related matters affecting the Parish which has covered several items on the agenda.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>Blocked drains</b> - Following the last meeting I have submitted a list of blocked drains around the village that need to be cleared. These have mostly been cleared now. I was advised that one of the specific issues with the drains outside the Co-op is being able to access them because of parked cars. Previously when no parking cones have been put in place to help with accessibility, people have either moved them or removed them completely. I did ask if it would be possible to carry out the work before the Co-op opens on Sunday but on this occasion the equipment has been able to access the drains.</li> <li>2. <b>Station access</b> - There continue to be some problems with large vehicles turning right up Station Road to access Bells bakery. John (Judson) and I met with Michael Bell and Kevin Crawley from Highways on 3 October to progress a solution. It was agreed that</li> </ol>

		<p>additional signage will be installed to try to reduce this ongoing problem. Other options that will be pursued will include a review of the current parking arrangements around the junction.</p> <p><b>3. Footpath 339025 at the Lilacs</b> - I can advise that a new order to close a greater length of the path until May 2020 is now in operation. There has been no consultation as this is a new application (rather than an extension to the previous order) and has been necessary to address the fact that a section of the footpath had been closed and disturbed without legal authority.</p> <p><b>4. Traffic issues</b> - The responses to the recent informal traffic issues consultation will be presented to the County Council's Local Committee for Eden for consideration later this month.</p> <p><b>5. Councillor Carrick also requested the following</b> - Please could you please have a quick discussion about the infrastructure that it is important for residents to be able to access during a time of emergency, and email me your conclusions. For example, if the village were to be hit by extreme weather, which assets in the village would people need to be able to access. This may include the Co-op, the village hall etc. and should be those facilities or collection points that are necessary in the case of an emergency.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that County Councillor Hilary Carrick be thanked for her report, the contents of which were noted.</p> <p><b>ALSO RESOLVED</b> that it be noted that County Councillor Hilary Carrick has also included other agenda items on her written report which will be dealt with at the appropriate agenda item.</p>

The results were as follows:</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">           Votes cast 239            Turnout 27%            For 211 [88%]            Against 27 [12%]            1 spoiled paper         </p> <p>There were also 12-15 people at each drop-in.</p> <p>The Neighbourhood Plan was declared approved. This is the end of a great deal of work by a number of people. The Parish Council would like to thank members of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group who have worked so hard on the Neighbourhood Plan for the past six years and persevered despite a number of setbacks and delays. The next step will be for Eden District Council to formally adopt the Plan as material in the determination of planning applications for development within Lazonby Parish. A date for this is still to be announced but it is hoped it will be in January 2020.</p> <p><b>RESOLVED</b> that the report about Lazonby's Neighbourhood Plan be noted with thanks to the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Groups for their years of hard work to get the plan through the referendum and approved.</p>

They would also be considering projects from other counties but it is really good to look at what's happening in Cumbria. So if the Parish Council has undertaken some work in this area that they are happy to talk about, could they let CALC know.

3. **Council motion request re national community energy campaign** - Steve Shaw, Director of Power for People, has written to ask the Parish Council to help their campaign for more local, clean energy generation that would benefit local communities. They are a not-for-profit organisation campaigning for the Local Electricity Bill – that they authored – to become law. The Bill is currently supported by a cross-party group of 115 MPs. The Bill aims to solve the current problem whereby local renewable energy generators, such as community energy groups, are unable to sell energy that they generate to local people. This is because of the huge setup and running costs involved in doing so. The Bill would fix this problem by establishing a Right to Local Supply that would make the costs of selling locally generated clean energy proportionate to the scale of the operation. This would benefit the existing community energy groups across the country and, even more excitingly, create the opportunity for huge growth in such groups and other local clean energy providers. If the bill became law it would be excellent news for Parish and Town Councils that wished to set up their own energy companies to sell locally generated renewable energy to local people, as the setup and running costs involved would be proportionate and thus a fraction of what they are now. The revenues received by such councils could be ploughed back into local emissions reduction schemes and other local services and facilities. Could the Parish Council please help by doing the following? Ask Lazonby Parish Council to pass a motion in support of the Local Electricity Bill. A model resolution has been given as an example.
