Option to opt-out of the SAAA Central External Auditor Appointment Arrangements.	<p>TO CONSIDER Option to opt out of the SAAA Central External Auditor Appointment Arrangements.</p> <p>ALSO TO RECOMMEND that the Parish Council continue the existing contract as any changes to opt out would be extremely problematic and result in extra costs and work.</p> <p><u>Report of the Treasurer to Council.</u></p> <p>Under the Local Audit (Smaller Authorities) Regulations 2015, SAAA is responsible for appointing external auditors to all applicable opted-in smaller authorities, for setting the terms of appointment for limited assurance reviews and for managing the contracts with the appointed audit firms. Smaller authorities are those whose gross annual income or expenditure is less than £6.5 million.</p> <p>The next 5-year appointing period runs from 2022-23 until 2026-27 and SAAA has undertaken a procurement exercise to appoint auditors to each County area from 1 April 2022. Now that the submission deadline for the 2021-22 Annual Governance and Accountability Returns has passed, this is to advise you of the option to opt out of the next round of 5-year audit appointments. All authorities require an appointed external auditor even if the authority meets the criteria to qualify for an exemption, as a Certificate of Exemption is required to be submitted to the external auditor and the auditor must be in place in case of objections from local electors.</p> <p>During the previous 5-year period all smaller authorities were 'opted-in' to the central procurement regime managed by SAAA - no authority decided to 'opt-out' and follow the various complex procedures required under statute to appoint their own external auditor. If you wish to continue as part of the SAAA sector led auditor appointment regime then no action is required, you will remain part of the central scheme.</p> <p>However, all authorities must be given the option to opt out of the central procurement and appointment scheme and appoint their own external auditor for the next 5-year period, although the process is onerous for smaller authorities.</p> <p>This is communication is to advise that whilst all smaller authorities are opted into the central procurement of external auditors by default, any authorities who do not wish to be part of the SAAA arrangements must formally notify SAAA that they wish to opt out within 8 weeks of this communication but no later than 28th October 2022; this decision must be communicated to SAAA via email to admin@saaa.co.uk.</p> <p>If notification of your decision to opt out is not received within this 8-week period, then your authority will be regarded as opted-in for the next five-year period beginning on 1 April 2022 and ending on 31 March 2027.</p>

Although CALC has not had a definitive answer from the workstream dealing with the Elections on whether the new Unitary Authorities will bear those costs it is best to be prepared in case Parish Councils are required to pay for them. For an idea on costs for an election in your area, as these currently vary, Parish Councils will have to contact your District or Borough Council, but they can be in the region of £2,000. CALC will be attending a meeting of the Electoral Administrators Cumbria group in September 2022 and has asked for this matter to be included on the agenda.</p>

Request from Lazonby Village Hall Committee to review electricity use.	<p>TO CONSIDER a request from Lazonby Village Hall Committee to review electricity use.</p> <p><u>Report of the Clerk to Council.</u> The Parish Council installed two street lights in 2016 with permission of the Village Hall Committee in response to concerns from parishioners about the lack of lighting on a dangerous corner with Scaur Lane. The lights were attached to the building and an agreed price of £100 per annum was then paid to the Village hall for electricity use. The Village Hall Committee are asking if the Parish Council would consider an uplift to the lighting grant as the cost of electricity has risen and their bills have hugely increased. The Electricity bills in April, May and June of 2021 averaged £37.95 per month, but in April, May and June of 2022 have averaged £71.34 per month with the similar use of the hall. The Village Hall Committee is happy to provide further information for the Parish Council to consider this request.</p>

Tree Planting Funding Opportunity - open to Town & Parish Councils Every year, ITF supports community groups to achieve their tree-planting ambitions. They are inviting you to send your ideas and proposals. This could be something small, such as a community woodland or orchard. Or it could be a large-scale project like landscape restoration or rewilding. They are open to all sorts of project types so please get in touch through https://www.internationaltreefoundation.org/uk-grants There are two tiers of funding available:</p>

- Small scale: A maximum of £1,000 is available for projects of up to 1 year in duration. This could be small community woodland, orchards, hedging projects, etc.
- Larger scale: Projects to range from 1000 – 10,000 trees, with a maximum price equivalent to £1.50/tree (inclusive of tree protection). Most suitable for community woodland or hedging projects.

1. **The Tree Council - Branching Out Fund** - Grants for planting trees, orchards and hedgerows, open to Town & Parish Councils Grants for planting trees, orchards and hedgerows for schools, community groups, parish & town councils and Tree Warden Networks.

You can apply for trees, hedges, orchards, or any combination of these. Key requirements of this fund are that there is strong community involvement and that children and/or young people up to the age of 21 are involved in the planting, and ideally the planning and aftercare of the project. You can apply for between £200 and £2,000 (excluding VAT). Application opening and closing dates: Monday 18th July to Sunday 4th December.

5. **Cumbria's Plan Bee - A Pollinator Action Plan for Cumbria - "CUMBRIA's PLAN BEE"** – *a Pollinator Action Plan for our vitally important pollinators. Cumbria has a great reputation for its work on pollinators, including the highly successful Get Cumbria Buzzing Project, however, we need to do more by replicating our best work across the county. The development of Cumbria's Plan Bee is part of the Planting for Pollinators Project, developed through the Cumbria Local Nature Partnership and being led by the Cumbria Wildlife Trust. The aim of Cumbria's Plan Bee is to increase action for pollinators in Cumbria. It aims to help mobilise people, councils, communities, farmers, landowners and business – in fact everyone in Cumbria - to act to improve food sources and habitat for these species. The Plan will outline priority actions and opportunities to help conserve and*

enhance pollinators and their habitats and will seek commitments from key organisations, groups and landowners to deliver on these. **We want to get everyone thinking about pollinators, everyone to take some action (however small) and to get every available piece of land working for pollinators.** The Plan will sit under the developing Local Nature Recovery Strategy and will aim to deliver its key outcomes for pollinators by identifying a suite of priority actions for different organisations, communities and businesses. We will be developing the Plan over the coming 6 months and will be consulting widely, including engagement with local communities across Cumbria. **We hope you will be willing to input your thoughts and expertise into this work and then work with us to secure commitments to deliver change.** We will be in contact shortly with some further information and hope to access your expertise and support through a range of webinars, questionnaires and individual meetings. If you have a preference as to how you would like to help/engage at this stage please let us know.”

Now is your opportunity to put forward ideas as to how pollinators can be helped in your community, your workplace or Cumbria in general. We are very keen to get your ideas as to how we can improve things for our pollinators and what you see as the priorities. 6. **Common Land** - Lorayne Woodend Wall, the MRTPI Planning Officer at Friends of the Lake District has stated the following:

“This message is pertinent to those Parishes containing any Common Land and/or a designated town or village green. This can be checked using the relevant layers on **DEFRA’s MAGiC mapping service**. You will need to select the ‘Registered Common Land’ and ‘Village Greens’ layers under the ‘Access’ heading. You may need to zoom out to see the town/village green notations. Friends of the Lake District has a long-standing involvement with Common Land and town and village greens in Cumbria, which includes our lobbying and campaigning for their protection. Although not a new issue, recent cases we have been involved in have increased our awareness that works are being carried out on Common Land (and town and village greens) without the proper consent or appropriate scrutiny. This includes cases where someone has secured planning consent for the works. Sometimes people are aware that they need, and then obtain planning consent but do not realise that separate Common Land consent is also necessary. However, in other cases they are unaware, or simply press ahead knowing that there are weaknesses in the reporting and enforcement of Common Land breaches. This issue is relevant across Cumbria, where we have one third of all the Common Land in the country, meaning its landscape, culture, character and heritage are all heavily influenced by it. In the Lake District National Park there is the additional dimension of Common Land being one of the attributes of Outstanding Universal Value of the World Heritage Site. Common Land should have extra protection by virtue of the World Heritage Site being a heritage asset of international value. It is therefore really important that where it is required, including where it is needed alongside planning consent, that Common Land consent is sought. This will help to ensure that the impacts on Common Land are

		<p><i>given appropriate consideration. Failure to do this devalues Common Land, risks harm to and loss of Common Land and puts at risk the benefits and value it has for the landscape, our cultural heritage and for society. We have considered what might help to improve this situation. Whilst legislative or procedural changes might be a longer-term answer, we'd like to explore some simpler but more immediate actions. We would be grateful if those Parishes that contain any Common Land (or whose boundaries adjoin it), or a town or village green, would confirm whether or not they would be willing to support Friends of the Lake District in actions including: raising general awareness of the issue and why it's important to address it asking relevant local planning authorities to add an advisory note to relevant planning decision notices asking relevant local planning authorities to consider including references to Common Land in planning policies and guidance We are not seeking financial support but rather support through measures such as sharing our relevant social media posts, letting the relevant planning authority know that your Parish supports us and agreeing that we can confirm in communications on the topic (with pre-agreed messaging) that we have your backing. I'd be grateful if you would let me know your initial thoughts and whether or not your Parish would be willing, in principle, to support us. We'd be more than happy to meet, either in person or via Zoom or Teams, to discuss this work; please do get in touch if you would like further information."</i></p> <p>7. Chief Executive Appointed for Westmorland and Furness Council - At a Shadow Authority for Westmorland Furness Council meeting, Members agreed that Sam Plum should be appointed as the Westmorland and Furness Council's Chief Executive. Sam Plum was chosen as the proposed appointee by the Westmorland and Furness Senior Appointments Committee following an extensive recruitment process. The appointment will start on 31st December 2022.</p> <p>15. Emergency Information Sheet - CALC has created an Emergency Information Sheet (EIS) for Town and Parish Councils to complete, for those areas that don't have an Emergency Plan and don't have the resources to create one. It is quick and easy to complete yet still gives useful information to emergency services and agencies in case of an emergency or event. It would be really helpful if this EIS template attached could be completed and emailed back to me. CALC will then store these documents on their system so they can be accessed if required. If you do already have an emergency plan in place, please could you let me know and email me a copy. CALC also encourage those who do not wish to lead on emergency planning for their area, to be part of any community ERG that exists or is in formation in their Town or Parish, due to their invaluable local knowledge. There is also the option of completing the Emergency Information Sheet (attached) which also gives valuable information to emergency services in case of an event or emergency.
